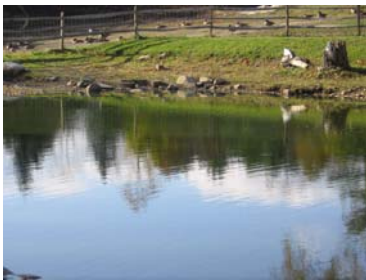

Cleaner Pond Water at Charmingfare Farm

This spring, the working relationship with Charmingfare Farm is taking its next step forward, and maybe even its final step. Last fall, our students began the work of studying the eutrophic conditions of the farm's pond, and making the plan for reclaiming the pond's quality. Phase One began last November, when students and farm employees teamed up to build the 20 foot long waterfall. Next, in Phase Two, it will begin pumping water out of the bottom of the pond, and running it through the waterfall, one of the many ways this group, under the direction of UNH Water Resources MS student and JRHS Science Teacher, Susan Wilderman, has come up with to improve this pond. Now, moving onto Phase Two and Three, we will be



studying and utilizing solar energy to power the pump; planting vegetation to make a nutrient burn; and adding barley to the water to counteract the algae.

This project also offers great small business training for the students as well, in that all sales go to the Urban and Outdoor Education Trip Fund. The gallons sell on average for \$50, so this year's gross sales could tip \$5,000! Nice work team!

At this event, student groups from all over New England and New York will assemble before the panel of judges to have their work adjudicated. We are bringing down singing and instrumental groups for the challenge!
