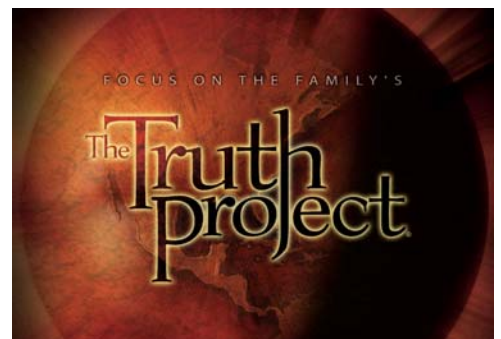
Farm has been mutually beneficial. We have worked to clean up their eutrophic pond and they have offered us a wonderful real-life environmental project. This Fall's goals include

FOREIGN STUDENT UPDATE
