The pavilion is appropriately named "Rivendell", taken from Tolkien's *Lord of the Rings*—a place of rest and preparation.

Jesse Remington High School's Timber Frame Project has been a legacy event for nearly as long as the school has existed. This year's project was especially meaningful, as the students constructed a beautiful pavilion on campus, providing a new outdoor space. The raising occurred in early June, culminating two quarters of hard work. The pavilion was entirely constructed and raised by students, faculty, and volunteers from the community.

This was personally my fifth timber frame project, as I have been able to participate in the class for all of my tenure at Jesse Remington. I began my freshman year with the Auburn Historical Society Barn, where we constructed a large structure that is used to house a historical sleigh. In the next year, the crew undertook two projects, the first being dugouts for the Candia Youth Athletic Association. The second was a cabin on Lake Winnepesaukee, built for an alumni family who wished to have a Jesse Remington constructed home. The project my junior year was a combination of a storage shed and a sauna, built in Jackson, NH.

Finally this year's Pavillion, my senior year project, was just recently completed, and the first classes are beginning to be held in it. I am very honored to have been a part of this legacy project at Jesse Remington, culminating in an incredibly useful and structurally handsome pavilion.

DEVELOPMENT UPDATE - RECORD YEAR OF GIVING!




Thank you to those who supported JRHS this fiscal year, which ends on June 30, 2021! JRHS raises funds for a variety of specific purposes including Athletics, Campus Development, our International Student Program, Mission Trips and for Scholarship purposes. The most important area of giving is to our Annual Fund which is unrestricted giving to be used where needed most.

This fiscal year we have received gifts from 170 supporters totaling more than \$200,000. Within this giving total, \$24,000 is directed towards a school van and \$55,000 has been raised to date for the Smyth Building renovation.

This year's budgeted annual fund goal was \$125,000. With less than a month to go in this fiscal year, gifts totaling \$130,000 have been directed to the Annual Fund! These gifts are an investment in the lives of the students and help JRHS prepare them for life service in the Kingdom of God. We praise and thank God for these gifts and pray God's blessing on those who have blessed us.

Did You Know?

If you are more than 72 years old and must take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your IRA, you may be able to save money on your taxes by turning that distribution into a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). The QCD provision is one of the biggest breaks in the tax code as it allows your gift to be made with pre-tax dollars, even if you do not itemize deductions as may now well be the case given the changes made to the tax code in recent years.

SMYTH MEMORIAL BUILDING A CAMPUS EXPANSION FOR JESSE REMINGTON HIGH SCHOOL

We are excited to announce our latest campus development project at the Smyth Memorial Building. This lovely building, formerly the town library, has sat vacant and unused for nearly 20 years. In partnership with the Town, Jesse Remington High School has created a path forward to upgrade the building, making it available for school and community groups.



The Smyth building sits prominently in the middle of our campus, in close proximity to the Church and Schoolhouse classrooms. It will offer two very nice classrooms, a break room and bathroom, and a nice meeting room. The architecture of the building lends itself to an excellent learning space, inspiring, open and ample natural light. As a former library, it will serve as ideal space for Humanities, History, Literature, English, Bible, Music and Art courses where a main part of the learning process involves writing, dialogue, analyzing or creating.

Adding this building to JRHS is advantageous in two ways. First, we can offer a better education to our students. This will become the largest classroom on campus, giving us the option to not use some of our smaller, less effective rooms. Secondly, JRHS will now have two sections of campus with space to grow into a larger student enrollment. The long-stated enrollment of 50 students can now be achieved and surpassed.

The Fund Raising for the project is off to a strong start, now over \$55,000, which is approaching 40% of the total value of the renovation - \$150,000. FEATURED PROJECT CLASS: ART By Austin Seo ('21)



Despite last year's setbacks, Jesse students took a brave step toward getting back to normal by going on a mission trip. This year as our annual mission trip we decided to go into the local missions' field and spent the week at Dreamers' Ranch, which was co-founded by Emily Shattuck, Jesse Alumna of 2004. This provided a unique opportunity for Jesse students to give back to their communities in two key ways: first by hosting a local kids group, and secondly, by conducting several large projects for the farm.



The first part of the day was dedicated to the hard work on the farm. This meant some teams were assigned to cleaning up the farm, doing chores such as moving wood and cleaning the chicken coop, while others were assigned to more rigorous tasks. The first of these tasks was the newly installed basketball court. This group installed the two basketball goals. The second project was the greenhouse job. These students were tasked with building and raising a 30x90 greenhouse. Next were the goat-pen students, who worked all week to install a new fence for the newly added goats. A small team made all 72 fence posts for the new goat yard. Finally, the "Chick-tick" team designed and made movable chicken coops that could be portable by car.



The kids camp took place each afternoon for two hours and provided fun gospel activities for kids from ages 4-12. These activities consisted of five different stations: arts and crafts where the Campers made a huge caterpillar; sports such as kickball and soccer; fun around the farm where the children pet the sheep, chased the chickens, and cuddled the bunnies; a gospel lesson where we taught the children about Jesus; snacks such as cupcakes; and finally, a building project where the kids raced RC cars. After this we would gather under a large pavilion and dismiss the kids home to their parents.

Each night, we held our own chapel service to conclude the evening. Various faculty members taught the parables throughout the week. Each night, about half of the students stayed on site, and half headed for a restful bed at home.

More than anything from this trip, I found a profound sense of community, which surprised me since I already believed that I had been connected fairly well to my local community. What I learned the most from this trip is that while global missions are most definitely important and needed, local missions provide a need that is not often met, and that giving back to your own community is something that you will never forget or regret.
